

Hello and welcome to MPSI1 class, Lycée Thiers. Note that the number of hours of English is limited to 2 hours a week (on Thursday mornings). Here are some guidelines to help you start the year in English.

1. Consolidate vocabulary and grammar

Dictionaries: you can use online dictionaries (such as *wordreference* and *reverso*), but you can also get one of the paper dictionaries. **Suggestions=** Robert & Collins **or** Oxford-Hachette.

Revise **grammar**, most notably:

- **tenses and aspects:** present simple / progressive; past simple / progressive; present perfect simple / progressive; past perfect simple / progressive; expressing future (present progressive; be going to; will; will be + V-ING) and conditional (present: would; past: would have + EN)
- **active and passive forms** (*they gave him a watch vs. he was given a watch*)
- **questions:** how to ask questions in English (place and tense of auxiliaries, etc.) + **indirect questions** (*I don't know what I'll get for my birthday vs What will you get for your birthday?*)
- **modals** (present and past: can / could; may / might; must; shall / should; will / would)
- **definite and indefinite articles:** a / an; Ø ; the
- **quantifiers:** little / a little; few / a few; much / many; most (of the)
- Revise **irregular verbs**. Here is a list of the 100 most common irregular verbs, with French translations. <http://gretaenglish.free.fr/supports/100virreg.htm>

2. Keep up to date with current affairs

Consult the **press** on a weekly/daily basis (internet/printed press) and note down lexis/ ideas/ examples in connection with the following topics:

AI and New Technologies/ the New Space Race/ The European Union & the UK (the consequences of Brexit)/ The British Monarchy (and its future with the new king) The general elections in the UK (July 4th) The US Presidency (Biden's administration + upcoming 2024 elections) Gun Violence in the US/ Race relations in the US.

Do pay particular attention to the power of the Supreme Court in the US, the consequences of Brexit on the UK and the EU, but also topics related to science and new technologies.

Listen to the radio and watch online videos. You can also podcast some radio programs.
