

- 1) On Thursday, his party announced that they would give the 16 to 17-year-olds the right to vote (as early as) at / in the next general election.
- 2) The government announced that reform which aims to improve equity for young people, a lot of whom already work and can serve in the military / are already employed and fit for service
- 3) The change, which has to be approved (of) by Parliament yet, is part of a landmark reform / vast reform / overhaul which aims to / intends to increase voter turnout in the UK.
- 4) Up to now / So far, only a few / a handful countries have allowed 16 to 17-year-olds to vote, among which / including Brazil, Austria and Argentina.
- 5) Almost everywhere else in the world, people have to be 18 to be able to vote.
- 6) Young people, who are trusted to work and pay taxes, should have a greater say in their future, all the more so since political decisions have long-term repercussions.
- 7) A special committee, which was created last April and whose mandate is to work on an electoral reform could study / look into the question.
- 8) Which does not mean that most inhabitants / the majority of citizens agree
- 9) Northern America's oldest French-language daily (newspaper), which was founded in 1884, has made large changes to its offer over the past years.
- 10) Its journalists, whose number has been reduced with the switchover to all-digital / fully-digital / only-digital content, have been awarded many prizes / have won many awards for the quality of their work
