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### **FACTS and EXAMPLES**

> Very few women have been awarded Nobel Prizes in its long history (since

1901) "only a tiny fraction of recipients have been female"

- only 7 out of 185 in chemistry
- only 12 out of 202 male winners in medicine
- > A few examples: Marie Curie (in physics in 1903 and chemistry in 1911)
- > the French virologist Françoise Barré-Sinoussi (in medicine in 2008 for discovering the HIV virus caused AIDS)
- > the Norwegian neuroscientist, May-Britt Moser
- > The French chemist Emmanuelle Charpentier (who does research in Berlin) for her work on CRISPR-Cas9
